Save The Peckwater Centre For Community Healthcare

The Peckwater Centre a dedicated primary care space, is under threat of closure to make way for secondary care services currently housed at the St Pancras hospital site.

The Centre, which played a vital role in vaccine rollout during the pandemic, currently



boasts a purpose-built gym and community garden. It hosts physiotherapy clinics, child vaccination teams, mental health services for the elderly and people in crisis, and the Camden wheelchair service. Existing plans to enhance the site by expanding services offered to Kentish Town residents have been shelved in favour of a money-saving move by the St Pancras Redevelopment Programme, which is struggling to rehouse clinical teams currently based on NHS land sold off

to developers and has laid claim to this valuable community resource. Local residents are working together to oppose the plan and save The Peckwater Centre.

A blow for the health of Kentish Town - NHS England's gold standard for primary care, health and social care teams based together in the heart of local communities, will be denied to the people of Kentish Town by the decision to close The Peckwater Centre. Doctors, residents, and local councillors are challenging the plan to give away the only purpose-built health centre with capacity to host new integrated teams, planned to include social care, respiratory and diabetes clinics, community groups and Childrens' services.

No consultation despite local impact - The public consultation for the St Pancras Redevelopment Programme promised local people that existing clinics based at the hospital site would remain there in a new state-of-the-art building. Instead, the programme wants to repurpose The Peckwater Centre to save money, but at the expense of residents who may lose existing services and will no longer benefit from plans to expand community health and social care in Kentish Town.

While the new proposals will see The Caversham Group Practice remain on the Peckwater site, GPs across Kentish Town have united to oppose the move which they see as putting local residents' future health at risk in order to meet the short-term demands of the struggling St Pancras programme.

Better options exist - that would preserve The Peckwater Centre for local people, but more suitable sites for the St Pancras clinics have been ruled out because the programme is unwilling to make funding available.
